Monday Session Summaries

The panel predicted the future in 3 categories: Trends in IT World, User Assistance, and Trends in Tools & Technologies. Among the predictions was a blockbuster, the prediction by Joe that within 2 years, one of the biggest authoring tools, RoboHelp, would "no longer be in common use." (See the story on the front page.)

Among the other predictions:

- Paula: Interaction with customer service is replacing help.
- Char: In 5 years, English will no longer be the lingua franca of the web.
- Joe: "Economic equilibrium" will slow documentation outsourcing within 3 years.
- Char: Structured authoring will be big. People who can take advantage of XML and who can do the structured authoring will find it easier to stay employed.
- Tony: HAT's will disappear as a separate software category. Replaced with add-ins to mainstream XML editing tools.

Alan walked an audience of about 100 attendees through the basics of structured authoring, with examples in Frame-Maker. A big buzzword here (as it probably will be throughout the conference) is XML, as in the format (or container) in which content will be delivered.

One point that Alan made is that it can be useful to start with a smaller pilot project when moving to structured authoring before making an enterprise-wide commitment. Such an approach will allow you to learn about the concept and the process for when you deploy fully.

A Successful Structure for Crafting Products to Improve **User Performance, Thom Haller**

Thom brought up the concept of intuitive models vs. feedback-driven models, which lies in how the image of the user is built. Feedback models are derived from real people, not a designer's imagination. The approach is to focus on what people want to do, not how to get work done by a release date.

XML for Help Authors, Tony Self

XML isn't a language, as Tony pointed out, it's a set of rules for writing languages. So you don't write in XML, you write in an XML. An XML is known as an XML application.

But more than just tell session attendees about XML applications, he created a small one to show how it works: DogML, and XML application to store information about dogs.
