## **15th Annual WritersUA Conference Trundles Down To Long Beach**

 $F^{\rm rom}$  the beginnings of Win-Help as a viable software development subculture, through the heyday of the Dot-Com era, enduring the Dot-Bomb, and now with the dawning of Web 2.0, the WritersUA Conference for Software User Assistance has been there. This year, the conference's 15th, "there" is here in Long Beach, CA.

That's right, 15th.

More than 400 user assistance professionals from across the country and around the world are here at the Hyatt these three days. People have come here from as far away as Great Britain, Australia, India, Denmark, the Czech Republic, Germany, Korea, Austria, and South Africa.

As usual, the conference has plenty of sessions with information about cutting-edge technologies, information that you can use to build the current and next generation of user assistance systems. But the conference also offers sessions for those new to the user assistance world, an opportunity for those folks to build their knowledge foundation and enjoy success at their work.

A number of speakers are also LaunchPad mentors. Launch-Pad is the program aimed at newer folks, but the mentors are around to help anyone. Look for them at breakfast each morning near the WritersUA information table.

This year's conference offers 60 sessions by 45 speakers, including favorites such as Dave Gash, Jared Spool, and Char James-Tanny, and ends Wednesday afternoon with a keynote by Geoffrey K. Pullum of the University of California, Santa Cruz, on the intriguing topic of "Far from the Maddening Gerund: Observations About Language."

### Session Summaries

A brief review from some of yesterday's sessions.

#### Introduction to Structured Authoring Tony Self

When companies are looking to adopt new methodologies for creating user assistance, they need also to understand whys they need it. Tony began his afternoon session by reviewing the whys, the benefits of structured authoring, benefits that included consistency of content and benefits to the business. He defined structured authoring as a publishing workflow that enforces consistent organization of information.

#### Developing a Working XML Application with Frame-Maker

Bernard Aschwanden

This session was very technical, with Bernard throwing around acronyms such as XML, XSL, XSLT, and EDD like politicians throw candy at a parade. But these are what's needed to move content in and out of a (structured) Frame-Maker application. Markers identify elements in such an application.

#### Writing for Small Spaces Rob Houser

This session focused a lot on just-in-time (JIT) user assistance, such as field-level pop-ups. Rob also took some time to talk about error messages, suggesting that useful error messages first describe the problem in the language of the user, are not accusatory, offer possible causes, and then provide solutions.

Rob also talked about the importance of conceptual information, and how it helps users understand how something works so that they aren't so much using step-by-step procedures to get through a task, but rather using that understanding to figure out how the system works to get the task done.
